On Sunday, November 1, our next Jubilee event, History and Harmony, takes place during our two worship services and at the Adult Forum.

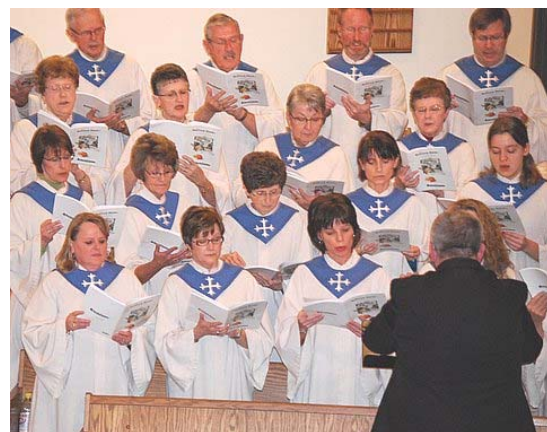

Our response to the flu and other pandemics

Planning for our Congregation's Response to the H1N1 Flu or other pandemics, our Calvary Congregational Council had a conversation in May about the pandemic flu and other disasters and concluded the following:

We will give members of our congregation permission at any time, if they are anxious about spreading or receiving germs, to choose to share the peace in an alternative way, to not shake hands after the service and to not participate in communion.

If we feel there is a greater risk of disease transmission as identified by public health authorities, we might ask people to have no physical contact. At that time, we may even invite those who feel they are at greater risk of becoming ill to not attend worship until further notice.

It is possible we may be asked by the governor to stop having worship as a means of stopping the spread of the H1N1 influenza.

Faith in Action Sunday is part of Calvary's year long Jubilee Celebration. October 11, Faith in Action Sunday, following each service (8:30 and 10:45) which will be a "sending" service, Calvary members will go into the community to assist individuals, families, groups or agencies with specific needs. Needs may include yard work, roadside cleanup, help with household chores, cemetery and park cleanups, sewing projects and visitations.

On Monday September 14, Stephen Ministers gathered for their monthly meeting of education and supervision. There were 14 in attendance.

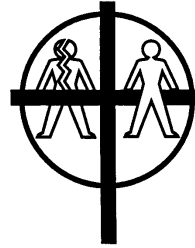

People often ask, "What exactly is a Stephen Minister?" One way to put it is that Stephen Ministers are the After People. Stephen Ministers are there:

After the phone call you hoped you'd never get...after the divorce papers are served and the bottom falls out of your life...after the funeral, when everyone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you...after the doctor says "I'm sorry but there's nothing more we can do..."after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home"...after the last child honks the horn, waves and drives away, and the house seems suddenly empty...after the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away...after the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible...after you find a pink slip with your final paycheck...after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the "After People." They are ready to come alongside you—or your friends, neighbors, coworkers or relatives—and provide comfort and support as long after as needed.

Financial Report

General Fund receipts for September to date through the 20th were \$25,672 or 70% of the budgeted revenues of \$36,454. There is one more Sunday remaining in the month.

Building Fund receipts for September to date through the 20th were \$5,761 or 99% of the amount needed to make the mortgage payment of \$5,832.

Actual results for August for the General Fund, was a net favorable variance of \$4,024. Total receipts for the month were \$37,116 and expenses were \$33,092. The Building fund receipts for the month were \$5,843, which were ahead of budget by \$11.

Year to Date through August, the General Fund has a net unfavorable variance of \$19,484 and the Building Fund is unfavorable by \$7,402. Currently our combined deficit for both funds continues to be significantly worse than last year. We need to have a few positive months to build up our cash balances and to avoid a significant shortfall later in the year. Please review your offerings and if you are able, consider helping us with additional offerings, which will help us work toward eliminating these deficits.

Calvary Missionary Support



Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.—Matthew 28:19

Calvary has been one of the congregations sponsoring missionaries Carol and Jim Sack for a couple years now. They are missionaries in Tokyo. Tokyo is a city of over 12 million people of which only 1-2% are Christians. Although 96% are affiliated with a Buddhist or Taoist temple, only about 30% are actually religious. In this context, the Sacks are extending our reach to the unchurched.

James is a professor of theology at the Japan Lutheran College and Theological Seminary. He also is providing education in pastoral counseling. Carol works integrating music with palliative care at the hospice there and helps her church provide for the needs of the homeless of central Tokyo. She wrote recently of the challenge of wanting to teach people to minister to the dying while many that are interested are not Christian.

Since the course is grounded upon the idea of "Music-as-Prayer," I simply could not teach the content without the faith component. The entire course is based upon a "spirituality of the Psalms."

Are You Listening?

This year during Sunday Rap, which happens in the Loft on Sunday mornings from 9:30am to 10:30am, we are going to be focusing on the parables of Jesus. I have often wondered why Jesus relied so heavily on parables. I mean, why not just come right out and say what you mean? Why tell these stories that are sometimes more difficult to figure out than a Rubik's Cube? (That's a reference for those of us who grew up in the 1980's.)

Currently I am reading through the book of Ezekiel as part of the Book of Faith initiative, and I think that reading through the Old Testament has shed some light of why Jesus would use parables. First, the harsh truth is that no one ever really listened to the prophets, at least not in the long run, and the Gospels tell us that most people figured Jesus to be a prophet. Samuel, Nathan, Elijah, Elisha, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and on and on they came speaking the word of God, only to be ignored and disobeyed. I imagine Jesus came expecting the same kind of treatment and so the parables are a more creative way to get us to think, help us to remember, and lead us to the truth.

Second, the life of a prophet was a perilous affair because the prophet was usually told by God to say some pretty harsh things to the misbehaving king and/or religious leaders in an attempt to get

She writes of a student who found a particularly meaningful passage for a man who had closed himself off. He was inspired to learn more and asked to be baptized before he died. He had found a faith that helped him shed his fear of death so that he passed with peace.

It is often said that a missionary's job is to work oneself out of a job. This is one of the rare times I could feel that I had really done my job.

Missionaries rely on the power of the prayers of God's people back home. Here's how we can pray for our missionaries: Pray that God would open doors in Tokyo for the gospel message to be heard. Pray that the Sacks would discover those doors and have boldness in witnessing (Ephesians 6:19). Pray for their spiritual and physical protection—from illness, for safety in their home and as they travel and from stresses, worries, temptations or relationships that might hinder their ministry. Finally pray that if it is the Lord's will, they might see some fruits of their labor to gladden their hearts and encourage them.

We don't always know the end result of our mission work, but God's work uses our hands. We can support our missionaries through our annual budget and through our prayers.

them to change their ways. The unfortunate consequence of this was that the prophet's life was usually threatened. In 1 Kings 18:4 it is stated matter of fact, "Jezebel was killing off the prophets of the LORD." The imprisonment and beheading of John the Baptist is probably a more familiar example of a prophet paying the price for speaking the truth so plainly. Yes, speaking the word of God has always been a dangerous profession and again, I imagine Jesus would have expected this. Certainly the parables make us think and help us remember, but I also wonder if Jesus didn't utilize parables to buy himself a little more time before the religious leaders could end his life. Trying to figure out the allegory and symbolism within his messages not only took time, but also made it harder for the religious leaders to prove Jesus was speaking directly against them. This is probably related to why Jesus often commanded his disciples "to tell no one" after performing a miracle, as he wanted to maximize his time here in this world.

The first parable that we looked at was the parable of the sower ([Mark 4:1-20](#), [Matthew 13:1-23](#), and [Luke 8:1-15](#)). What I found interesting was that this parable is begun with Jesus saying, "Listen!" And it is concluded with Jesus saying, "Let anyone with ears to hear listen!"

Dear disciples of Christ at Calvary,

We are starting the fall season with great excitement. Jesus calls us into mission to our community and world and we are answering the call. You read in the newsletter about Sunday School and Confirmation, youth group, Community Outreach and Twigs, men's and women's ministries, Jubilee celebrations and Faith in Action. Our worship brims with energy and lively music. It is a joy to serve with you as we participate in God's work in the world.

I'm hearing reactions from many of you about the recent votes on the ministry of partnered gay and lesbian persons by the ELCA Churchwide Assembly. Your responses are all over the map, and show once again that we are a diverse congregation, each shaped by our own experiences and faith. At Calvary, we have members celebrating this decision and others who are grieving deeply. I know many of you are having conversations about this vote with your friends outside the ELCA, some of whom are deeply critical of these choices. Some have said they are embarrassed that others would make them feel "less Christian or no longer believing in the Bible." Some of you are considering leaving Calvary and the ELCA. I hope that you will take your time before you make decisions about responding to the ELCA vote to get accurate information, come to a session to discuss the issue, or talk with me individually. I am available to you by phone or in person.

In Bishop Wohlrabe's blog, he compares this vote to the vote almost 40 years ago in 1970 to ordain women into the LCA and ALC, the two predecessor churches of the ELCA. It was very controversial at the time, and the argument was similar. There were specific scriptural verses prohibiting women in ministry, and others that affirmed women in ministry. It was also becoming apparent that God had given women the gifts and seemed to be calling women into pastoral ministry. Those three components are also part of this conversation about accepting into ministry in the ELCA gay and lesbian persons in lifelong, committed relationships. There are seven specific texts in scripture that prohibit homosexual behavior. But a variety of other texts mitigate the force of the traditional Biblical prohibitions. Examples: Jesus' bias toward outsiders, Jesus' redefinition of Old Testament notions of "uncleanness," God's unconditional love for sinners, Jesus' command to love the neighbor unconditionally, the early church's decisions to include Gentiles and others (e.g. the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts) formerly considered "unclean," etc.

Looking back, I can't imagine being without women in ministry in the church. Calvary has been blessed with the strong ministry of two ordained women, Marilyn Breckinridge and Karin Moberg, and we have strong women leaders leadership in our council and all other levels of our congregation. I know that at first that was uncomfortable for some of you.

We don't expect that all of our members need to agree on everything. This vote does not require any particular response from us. And the power is certainly in our congregation's hands. When we call a pastor, the call committee and the congregation have total control of who we call to be our pastor.

Let's keep talking and praying about this issue. I'm not discouraged by this debate. You have been very civil in your conversations, respectful of others, and genuinely seeking to learn from each other. We trust that finally the church is in God's hands, and that God will help us to find a way to walk together in unity.

The use of an exclamation point beginning and ending this parable is significant to me. That one character speaks volumes, regardless of the meaning of the parable. That "!" means to me that Jesus desperately wants to be heard, that Jesus desperately wants us to hear what he has to say. To me it also conveys a sense of urgency, as Jesus knows he doesn't have a lot of time on this earth. He knows full well his days are numbered.

I am currently reading "Stories with Intent" by Klyne Snodgrass which is a book about the parables. In it, the author writes, "the parables of Jesus awaken insight, stimulate the conscience, and move us to action." In addition, he writes that Jesus (as well as all the other prophets I think) were "trying to get God's people to stop, reconsider their ways, and change their behavior." Two thousand years later these stories continue to challenge us to do just that. But as the author picks up on, listening to Jesus is not enough. Hearing the word of God is not enough. For more than 4,000 years people have heard the word of God, but who is willing to let His word change you and move you to action? This is the kind of listening Jesus was looking for. The author concludes, "Any hearing that does not result in productive living in relation to the Father is not valid hearing." I think my wife would agree and has similarly concluded on many occasions that any hearing that does not result in immediate action in relation to her request is not valid hearing. She can ask me to take out the garbage, but if I do not take it out, then obviously she is going to feel like I did not hear her or listen to her. I imagine Jesus felt the same way and perhaps this is the meaning of Jesus bracketing the parable of the sower with exclamation points. Jesus isn't seeing anybody, in particular the religious leaders, moving or changing in relation to what he is saying. So while Jesus yells out "Listen!" what he is really shouting at us is, "Move! Act! Change! Do something that shows you are listening!"

My hope this school year, especially meaningful as we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Calvary, is for all of us to do something that shows we are listening.
