



Responding To The Book Of Faith

At the beginning of January, we began the Book of Faith Initiative, which is a program created by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to encourage and support people in reading God's Word in 2009.

A small group of people at Calvary have been active in using the Book of Faith on line discussion board located at www.bookoffaith.ning.com/group/calvaryperham.

Here people can post comments, questions, and sometimes frustrations about their Bible reading. Other people can then view postings and respond, thereby generating an online discussion that can be accessed any time.

We invited Abby and Amber Kalina, sophomores at Perham High School, to share a little bit about their experience being a part of this online forum.

When I first decided to read the whole Bible along with the others who were going to, I thought it would be just as confusing or hard to understand as it was the first time I read some of the Bible chapters. I have found out now that it is different. By re-reading and by using a less complex Bible (The Message) I have been able to better understand what the "Book of Faith" is about.

I have also found out that it is fun to talk to people about some of the things you don't understand. By going on the Book of Faith website I am able to talk to others about different situations in the Bible or just some different faith things that are hard to understand. It is great to find out what other people think about the same topic that fascinates you when reading the Bible.

One of my favorite conversations is talking about the Fifth Plague and how the Egyptians still had hundreds of horses when they were all supposed to be killed. It was fun to share my opinion on what could have happened and see what other people thought of my opinion. It's also fun to see where conversations lead. For example, when we were talking about the Fifth Plague and then we went to why the Israelites had so much gold and jewels with them, and even got so far as to ask why the Israelites didn't just bring extra food out of Egypt and make everything out of bread! So instead of the golden calf it would be the breaded calf or the bread Tent of Meeting and even a bread Tabernacle.

It [The Book of Faith] is great fun and a great learning experience!

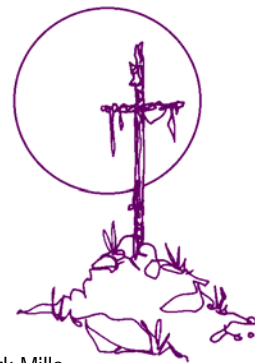

Our goal for each child attending Calvary's Sunday School is to learn about and experience the love of our Lord Jesus Christ, and acquire knowledge of the Bible through a variety of learning experiences. We believe it requires a joint effort between teaching staff and parents to educate a child in the church. Teachers provide a foundation, yet it is when lessons are reinforced at home that the real learning takes place. We encourage you to make discussing Sunday School materials brought home by your child a special event in your home.

Why Being Lutheran Is Important



I fell into the Lutheran church. I was not born and raised in the church, in fact I have spent the better part of my life outside the church. My wife was born and raised in a Lutheran church south of the twin cities and so when God finally got my attention it was natural that we went to her church. So it is not like I studied all the different Christian denominations and said, "Lutherans! They're the ones that got this thing figured out." But I believe God made my home here for a reason.

There is an old adage that states if you want to learn something, then teach it. I think that is very true, because as I have prepared to teach the Lutheran Course and have dived deeper into the Book of Concord, I have become even more aware of why being Lutheran is important.

First, being Lutheran means you are **Word-oriented**. As Luther looked at the church and then studied the Bible, he realized there was a great disparity between the two. He was able to see that human traditions and ambition had crept into the church that were not supported by God's Word. The reformation he sought was to practice only those rituals and traditions that were justified by the scriptures. One example of this was his belief that there were only two sacraments, baptism and communion, because only these two were commanded by Christ.

Second, being Lutheran means you are **Grace-oriented**. One of Luther's greatest contributions was rediscovering God's grace during a time when God's judgment and condemnation were being promoted. The proverbial straw that broke the camels back for Luther was the church's sale of indulgences, which were certificates granting salvation to anyone living or dead. In his 95 Theses, Luther wrote:

"There is **no divine authority** for preaching that the soul flies out of purgatory immediately the money clinks in the bottom of the chest."

"Any Christian whatsoever, who is truly repentant, enjoys plenary remission from penalty and guilt, and this is given him **without letters of indulgence**."

"Why does the pope not liberate everything from purgatory for the sake of love (a most holy thing) and because of the supreme necessity of their souls? This would be morally the best of all reasons. Meanwhile he redeems innumerable souls for money, a most perishable thing, with which to build St. Peter's church, a very minor purpose."

Luther clarified that our salvation is a gift. It cannot be earned. It cannot be repaid. It can only be accepted. Luther pointed to the scriptures and highlighted for us Romans 3:23-24: "since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift..." Our motto is that we are **justified by grace through faith**.

Finally, being Lutheran means you are **Spirit-oriented**. In explaining the third article of the Apostle's Creed, Luther wrote in the Small Catechism, "I believe that I cannot by my own understanding or effort believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him. But the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, and sanctified and kept me in true faith." Luther was very aware that we are dependent on the power of the Holy Spirit to lead and guide us. This is also why baptizing infants is so critical, because Luther understood that baptism is not about what we do, but about what God does. As John the Baptist said, "I have baptized you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 1:8). It is through the Holy Spirit that we are claimed as God's own.

Growing Stephen Ministry

Reg Hansen, Coordinator of Stephen Ministry at Calvary was among 382 pastors and congregational leaders at a Stephen Ministry Leadership Training Course (LTC) held January 11-17 in Orlando, Florida. The one-week training event was hosted by the Stephen Ministers organization based in St. Louis, Mo. Participants came from across the U.S. and Canada to learn how to implement and direct Stephen Ministry, a system of Christian caregiving in their congregations. People from dozens of denominations put aside their differences for 7 days to focus on a single mission; how to bring Christ's love to hurting people.

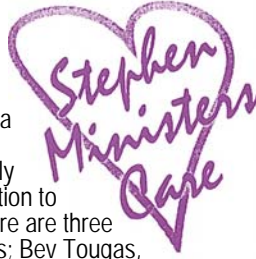
Reg Hansen now has been trained as a Stephen Minister and as a Stephen Ministry leader. Now the next step will be to recruit, select and train additional members of Calvary as Stephen Ministers, the ones who will provide one-to-one care. Stephen Ministers are then matched with individuals who need care and provided with regular supervision and continuing education.

Calvary has had a Stephen Ministry program for nearly 10 years. In addition to Reg Hansen, there are three additional leaders: Bev Tougas, Net Kupferschmid and Barb Christie. Currently there are 18 active Stephen Ministers providing care to individuals.

Our intent is to increase the number of trained Stephen Ministers in order to increase the amount of care we can provide to Calvary members and to individuals in the Perham and surrounding communities.

Reg Hansen found the LTC to be extremely valuable and well organized and run; not a surprising result for the Stephen Ministry organization of St. Louis.

Reg also expresses his deepest appreciation to Calvary Lutheran for making this opportunity available. He is confident that the investment will become evident in an expanding and improving Stephen Ministry program.



Project New Hope Presentation

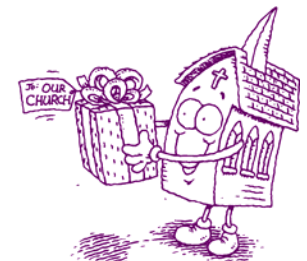
